Dear Families,

This time last year, as we celebrated Christmas 2019 and looked forward to what 2020 might bring, we never imagined facing such a challenging year. This term has brought much uncertainty and anxiety, however we are very pleased to have been able to safely open for all of our children and we are grateful for your support throughout this difficult time.

A highlight of the year was being able to fully re-open our academies in September. It was fantastic to have our academy staff back to welcome our children and provide them with an element of a more normal way of life through the education they are both entitled to and deserve. There were, of course, anxiety and concerns that were shared by parents and staff alike, but through our risk assessments and safety measures, and your observance of these, staff, children and families were all able to return with confidence. We are proud that the procedures we have in place have meant only eight bubble closures across the Trust, with six of our academies being unaffected. All positive cases of COVID-19 have come from outside of our academies and there has been no evidence of any internal transmission within our academies. Where bubbles have closed, we have been able to learn from the experience, tweaking arrangements and risk assessments as necessary, to continue to provide safe, secure environments for our children and staff.

Our strength and successes are underpinned by the collaborative nature of our Trust and this has never been more evident than it has during these past nine months. We have been able to support each other, at all levels, across all academies, learn from each other, and share challenges and ideas. Every member of staff has made a unique contribution and we would like to thank them for the part they have played in the successful reopening of our academies. Collaboration is a key element of the Trust's vision that has helped us work through the difficulties of the pandemic, whilst also moving the Trust forward for the benefit of all of our children.

Our families have been very supportive during this time and, although slight changes have been introduced as we continually assess the safety of our academies, these have been understood and accepted. Thank you!

Following our recent survey regarding Friday afternoon closures (for planning, preparation and assessment time for teaching staff), the majority of responses were in favour of the arrangements continuing. Given the uncertainty that we all continue to face, this we help us to ensure our academies remain safe places to be. There will be a further review of the Friday afternoon closure at February half term.

We hope that you all have a chance to relax and enjoy time with your families over the Christmas break.

My name is Kate Beer and I am the Inclusion & Welfare Officer for all of the academies in the Kite Academy Trust. My role is to provide the academy, as well as our parents and carers, with support and advice in all aspects of attendance.



Family Hub

This year has been a very different and challenging one! Being in the midst of a global pandemic, and the natural worries it causes is not something any of us expected to be living through. I am delighted though that the overall attendance in all Kite academies is far above the national average.

As we are in the middle of the cold and cough season, it can be difficult to judge when your child should or shouldn't be attending school. If your child presents with any COVID-19 related symptoms, they will be asked to stay at home until they receive a negative test, or they have completed 10 days isolation. If they are in isolation due to a family member testing positive, this extends to 14 days. The main symptoms for COVID-19 are:

- A high temperature
- A new continuous cough – coughing a lot for more than an hour or 3 or more coughing episodes in 24 hours
- A loss or change to sense of smell or taste

If your child appears to have a cold or any other minor ailment, and does not have any COVID-19 symptoms, they can attend school as normal.

The Department for Education has created a new attendance code for children who are off school specifically for COVID-19 related issues. If you are given, or request a copy of your child's attendance register from their academy, these absences will be shown with an X code. X coded absences do not have a negative impact on your child's attendance levels. The child must, however, be displaying at least one of the above symptoms and be either in isolation or awaiting a test result for themselves to have an X code. The other reasons for an X code are when the child is isolating whilst waiting for a family member's test result (from the same household), or they have been contacted as being in close contact with a COVID-19 positive person (Track & Trace). If your child receives a negative test result, but is still too unwell to attend school, then their code will be changed to I (illness), until they are well enough to return.

We pride ourselves that we maintain fantastic attendance levels throughout the academies. These are monitored weekly, and if at any point the attendance levels become a cause for concern, we will notify you in writing or by phone call. We will then monitor the situation until it reaches an acceptable standard of over 95%.

If as a parent or carer you have any concerns or questions in relation to attendance, please contact your Academy directly - I am on hand to assist wherever I can.

Learning Together

The Nurturing Programme is a 10-week parenting course that looks at family life in a thoughtful and fun way. It helps support positive behaviour in children and goes much further than that by looking at the emotional needs behind our children's behaviour.

- improving mental well-being
- improving the child's behaviour
- improving family relationships
- improves the child's long term educational and future prospects
- building self-esteem
- developing communication and social skills
- teaching positive ways to improve resolve conflict
- encouraging parents to take time for themselves
